Surely it is because the transition is yet rife with unanswered questions. What will it be like? How will we cope with the challenges of home ownership? Right beside the chair I occupy in worship is a plaque in loving memory of Joan Warren Hester, 1877-1964. Wow! I know this parish has been home to many people for a very long time. Many of you have attended here under the ministry of many different priests. The adjustments we've made since my arrival hopefully are beginning to feel a bit more like home for you as well, for feelings of home here on earth, especially as we have them among the family of God, are given us to let us know that already we are being included in the joys of heaven, where all things will finally come home.

1. SUNDAY SCHOOL

<u>Service Project:</u> The Sunday School will be doing a service project this Fall in support of Heifer International. We did this several years ago and raised \$120 with the support of the congregation. With this money, the children voted to purchase a goat for a needy family through Heifer outreach. We will be raising money throughout October and the first two weeks of November. We thank you for any support you can give us!

Heifer International: Since 1944, Heifer International has provided livestock and environmentally sound agricultural training to improve the lives of those who struggle daily for reliable sources of food and income.

<u>Adult Class:</u> The Adult class meets on Sunday mornings between the 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Services. This class is lead by Fr. Gene and Deacon Tom and is using Kerygma material for the Bible Study.

THIS ELECTION: VOTE EARLY

On Election Day, November 6, you might not be able to vote in the way you always have. Especially in Silver City, many of the polling places that you are accustomed to going to will not be open. Instead, the County Clerk has designed the Silver City Woman's Club, the Tyrone Community Center, and the Grant County Business and Conference Center (old Walmart) as "Voter Convenience Centers" where anyone registered in Grant County can vote – as the ONLY voting places in the Silver City area. Jose Barrios, the Public Library, Senior Center, WNMU, Sixth St School, Harrison Schmitt, La Plata, Public Safety – none of these voting places will be open. Voter Convenience Centers will also be in Bayard, Santa Clara, and Hurley. And most of the rural voting places will be open as always.

To ensure that you don't have any confusion on Election Day – and won't have to stand in line – VOTE EARLY. Early voting begins on Tuesday, October 9, at the County Clerk's office, 8am-5pm, Monday-Friday. It is also very important that you tell friends and neighbors – especially those who have traditionally waited until Election Day to vote.

Another change this year is that there will no longer be 'straight ticket' voting. You will NOT be able to check one box for all Democrat or all Republican candidates. Instead, you will have to go down the line and vote for each candidate individually. For more information, contact the Grant County Clerk at 574 0042.

PARISH HEALTH CORNER

TUMMY TROUBLES, ANYONE?

Some years ago, a physician in Australia who was convinced there was a germ causing ulcers, decided to drink a slurry of a bacterium named *Helicobactor pylori* to prove he would develop gastritis. Most people have heard of stomach irritation or peptic ulcers, but may not have heard of *H. pylori*. It is estimated that about half the world's population has this bacterium in their stomachs. Most folks do not have any symptoms, but those who do seem to notice a burning sensation in the abdomen, burping, bloating, nausea, vomiting or even weight loss. If any signs and symptoms persist, it is wise to get a medical assessment, particularly if there is difficulty swallowing or any bleeding from the bowels or in vomitus. This need not be frank, red blood, but could present as black, tarry stool or vomitus that looks like coffee grounds. While most people seem to have acquired the infection in childhood, it can be passed from person to person through saliva or fecal matter, for example, or even contaminated food or water. Crowded living conditions, such as may be found at our orphanage in Palomas, can contribute to passing the infection.

H. pylori can lead to inflammation of the stomach lining (gastritis), ulcerations and even stomach cancer. It is possible to diagnose the infection through blood or breath tests, looking for certain proteins in the stool, or through an endoscopic examination and biopsy.

Once diagnosed, it is possible to treat the infection with antibiotics and an acid reducer. The testing should be repeated after treatment to check for cure several weeks after the course of antibiotics is completed. Having resolved the infection does not protect you from acquiring it again, so be sure to follow good hand washing and kitchen cleanliness recommendations.


Animal Blessing
